
I. Project Introduction

The City of Ottumwa seeks qualified preservation architects to develop a Historic Structure Report for the First National Bank Building at 131 E Main in Ottumwa, IA.

II. Project Location and Current Initiatives

The First National Bank Building stands proudly at the critical Market Street and Main Street intersection in Downtown Ottumwa. The property was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1995 with significance under Register Criteria C. Standing on a corner, the builders in 1915 made a profound statement with the neo-classical facade that covers not just the front of the building but wraps all the way around the corner for 132 feet along Market Street.

When the building was acquired by the City in late 2020, it was packed floor to ceiling with debris, tools, antiques, and rubbish. Since acquiring the building, the City has coordinated with volunteers from Main Street Ottumwa and the Historic Preservation Commission to clean out the building. In addition, this project, the City is pursuing an Iowa's Rural Heritage Revitalization Grant with the State Historic Preservation Office to stabilize terra cotta on the facade and begin asbestos abatement.





III. Project Description

The proposed project represents a critical first step in a multi-phase plan to revitalize the First National Bank building that sits prominently on the corner of Market and Main Streets in downtown Ottumwa. The City acquired title to the building following a legal action to claim abandoned property. They City sees itself as a temporary custodian of this important historic asset. In that role, we have a duty for the preservation of history and economic development of our downtown to set the property on a path to a historic redevelopment.

The proposed Historic Structure Report will guide the City in determining what improvements, if any, we should pursue before seeking to hand the property to its next owner to complete the redevelopment. The report will also provide the critical information necessary for the next owner to complete the revitalization in a manner that suits their intended use while meeting the standards of an appropriate historic redevelopment.

This project will proceed if funded and supported by a State Historical Society of Iowa Historic Resource Development Program (HRDP) Grant.



IV. Submission Requirements

All respondents wishing to receive consideration must submit, in writing, the following information:



- A detailed description of the project team, which includes descriptions and resume/background information for all principals and their proposed level of involvement. Minimum qualifications should be equivalent to the <u>required</u> <u>qualifications</u> for a Field Services Consultant with the State Historic Preservation Office Technical Assistance Network
- 2. **Demonstrated experience in delivering superior preservation planning and architectural work product**, especially in the context of downtown buildings and Midwest small cities. Specific examples of similar projects are preferred.
- V. Selection Process

The responses to the Request for Qualifications will be reviewed by a small committee of individuals that represent the City of Ottumwa, Main Street Ottumwa, and the Historic Preservation Commission. If necessary, the committee will select two to three finalists for an interview with the committee for further discussion. Interviews will take place using Microsoft Teams.

1. What time are RFQ responses due on April 28, 2021?

Responses are due at the close of business at 4:30PM CDT on April 28, 2021.

3. Should the RFQ response include professional fees?

No. Professional fees will be negotiated with the selected respondent.

4. What was the architectural basis used for the 2021 Iowa's Rural Heritage Revitalization Grant?

The Iowa's Rural Heritage Revitalization Grant relied on a Facade Assessment Report prepared by Klinger and Associates for this and several other buildings on the 100 block of East Main St in 2016.

5. Do you expect to require the services of mechanical, electrical and plumbing engineers or structural engineers for preparing the report?

We do not want to duplicate work a developer with a specific intended use for the building will need to do on their own after purchase. We will not require a MEP engineering for the Historic Structure Report. There is a basement vault that extends some distance under the sidewalk and we would like an opinion about the structural condition of that vault and will leave up to the respondent whether that opinion requires the work of a structural engineer.

6. Should the Historic Structure Report contain the features described in National Park Service Preservation Brief #43: The Preparation and Use of Historic Structure Reports?

Yes, we used Preservation Brief #43 as the basis for seeking a Historic Structure Report.

7. Will the architect fees for the report be funded by the Historic Resource Development Program Grant?

Yes. At this time, we only intend to proceed with preparing the report if we are awarded the HRDP Grant.



8. Have you requested a Field Service Consultant Report from the Iowa State Historic Preservation Office?

We have not requested a Field Service Consultant Report. In preparing the Rural Heritage Revitalization Grant application it was indicated to us that the analysis needs required for this project exceeded what was available with that program.

9. Are original drawings of the building available?

We do not possess original drawings of the building at this time. As we have cleaned out the building, we have uncovered original drawings for several other downtown buildings. We hope to discover the original drawings for this building as well.

10. How much are you budgeting for the Historic Structure Report in the HRDP Grant application?

As we draft the application, we are expecting to request a \$10 thousand grant award to cover a \$15 thousand project. We are open to further discussion around fees with the selected respondent.



DESCRIPTION:

The First National Bank (1916) is a rectangular building located on the north corner of Market and Main streets, the major intersection in downtown Ottumwa. It measures $20' \times 132'$, with the primary facade located on the narrow end, facing Main Street. The flat roof slopes gently to the rear. Although the building appears to be two stories on the exterior, the interior originally featured a long narrow open bank lobby with a twenty-five foot ceiling. The rear portion of the building was divided into two floors for vaults and office space.

Neo-classical in style, both the primary and secondary elevations are sheathed in off-white terra cotta. A temple front is found on the primary facade, with monumental Composite Order columns flanking the entrance. The pediment and cornice feature modillions as well as dentils, with the cornice continuing around the side elevation. A terra cotta parapet caps the entire building. The pediment is not blank as is often found on Neo-classical designs, but features a cartouche with a foliated pattern of acanthus leaves. Directly below the pediment an identification panel in the entablature identifies this as the "Fidelity Savings Bank", a name acquired following the bank closings of the Great Depression. On each side of this panel is found a wreath of laurel leaves containing a single profile head: to the left is seen Mercury (10¢); and to the right is an Indian head (14) with the Roman numerals MCMXV. A stringcourse of acanthus leaves with a row of bead-and-reel is located just above the capitals. On the secondary elevation monumental pilasters separate ten sets of windows. Windows at street level are narrow slits with the diagonal star pattern so popular for public buildings and banks during this period, while those on the upper level are large rectangular openings, allowing light to flow into the bank lobby below. Windows throughout are of metal. At street level the original design provided two doors near the rear of the side wall (in section nine). Alterations include the opening of another narrow doorway in section seven, and converting section ten to a walk-up teller window.

In 1956 the Fidelity Savings Bank (locally known as "the Friendly White Bank on the Corner") remodeled both the interior and the exterior facade. The original entrance was replaced by the present recessed two story plate glass wall. The tall single story interior was divided into two floors to provide additional office space. Although this alteration is not apparent from the exterior, the sense of space on the interior was changed totally. Recent conversion from financial institution to retail space has removed the last remnants of the interior bank design although the vaults remain in place. While the installation of the plate glass on the facade is unfortunate, the overall design of the building is so strong that this alteration is not considered significant enough to negate eligibility.





DESCRIPTION (continued): U.S.C.S. map (reduced) indicates location in community.





1939 Plat Map shows exact location.



SIGNIFICANCE:

The First National Bank of Ottumwa (1916) is locally significant under Criterion C as an outstanding example of early 20th century Neo-classical bank design and is the only bank design in Ottumwa executed in terra cotta.

The first First National Bank building was constructed on this location in 1868, and it was rebuilt following a fire in 1881. For a number of years there were bank buildings occupying three corners at the intersection of Market and Main. By 1915 the bank officers determined the need for a more modern building. The use of a Chicago architect, H.H. Stoddard, indicates the seriousness with which the bank approached construction of a new building. Stoddard selected the Neo-classical style for his design. This style was becoming very popular for bank buildings as it evoked a feeling of trust, as well as elegance, and was considered to be appropriate for a banking institution. The decision to cover the entire exterior with cream colored terra cotta was a costly one, but it created an outstanding appearance. The building contains examples of all of the common Neo-classical elements: monumental columns, denticulated pediment and cornice, and rows of egg and dart, bead and reel, acanthus leaves, etc. There is a restraint in the design of the facade...it is not covered completely with lavish details, but uses these sparingly.

The American Contractor (2 Jan 1915) identified not only the architect, but also the engineers (E. Jackson Casse Co) and the general contractor (the Blackhawk Construction Company of Waterloo). It noted that the cost of the one story with basement bank was to be \$65,000 and construction was to start March 1, 1915.

As noted above, the selection of an out of town architect seems to indicate that the First National officers were determined to have a building of outstanding design. Just as John Morrell & Co. brought in an architectural firm that specialized in meat packing and cold storage facilities, and the Sisters of the Humilty of Mary hired an architectural firm which specialized in institutional designs for St. Joseph Hospital, so the First National Board of Directors selected a firm with experience in designing financial institutions. Although Stoddard is not presently as well known in Iowa for his bank designs as the Lytle Co. of Sioux City, future surveys and research may uncover additional works.


















